DEATH OF DR. W. BOWIE TYLER.—Dr. Walter Bowie Tyler died at Summerville, S. C., yesterday afternoon, of consumption. He had gone south in a vain search for health. He was forty-two years old and a well-known citizen of Georgetown. His father, Dr. Grafton Tyler, was for many years the family physician of the late W. W. Corcoran. The deceased was a widower and leaves one child. Dr. Tyler was educated at Georgetown college, and upon the breaking out of the late war he offered his services to the confederacy, but on account of his age, he then being about sixteen years of age, his offer was declined. He, however, followed Col. Snowden Andrews' command and Col. Mosby's during the rebellion.
